HIV Case Management

Case management is a range of client centered services that link clients with health care, psychosocial and other services to ensure:Timely, coordinated access to medically appropriate levels of health and support services.

A continuum of quality care that promotes the efficient use of resources while containing cost.

Ongoing assessment of the client's and other family members' needs and personal support system. The primary role of the case manager is coordination or arrangement of services (formal or informal) across a variety of service settings. In addition to the primary role of service coordination, case managers also assume a variety of secondary roles that are complimentary to coordination.

Care Coordinators provide formal and systematic methods to access client needs and access needed services through:

Care Coordination is available to any Missouri resident who is HIV infected. Participation in the Care Coordination Program is voluntary.

Individuals may be admitted to the program at any time during their disease process. Some services are based on income eligibility.

Individuals giving their permission may be referred by physicians, friends, volunteer organizations, local health departments or they may self-refer their entry into the care coordination system.

The following counties are served: Butler, Carter, Dunklin, New Madrid, Pemiscot, Reynolds, Ripley, Stoddard, and Wayne
